AFFIDAVIT OF JEANNIE SHOOK

NOW COMES Jeannie Shook, being first duly sworn and says as follows:

- I am Jeannie Shook and I am over the age of 18 years and competent to make this
 Affidavit and do so of my own personal knowledge.
- 2. I have personal knowledge of or am informed of and believe the facts set out in this declaration. If called upon, I could and would testify about the facts stated here.
- 3. I am Lead Animal Control Officer for Wake County Animal Control, and have worked in the animal control field for eleven years.
- 4. As Lead Animal Control Officer, I supervise ten Animal Control Officers. I am involved in animal cruelty investigations performed by Wake County Animal Control. In the case of animal cruelty that merits more than a warning, I investigate and determine whether criminal charges are warranted.
- 5. As Lead Animal Control Officer, I oversee my department's enforcement of local

- ordinances and state statutes governing animals.
- 6. I have been involved with between twenty-five and fifty investigations involving animal hoarding in my career in animal control. I have obtained significant knowledge and an understanding of animal hoarding through these cases and through working with veterinarians and others with experience in the field.
- 7. The hallmark of an animal hoarding scene is large numbers of animals who are suffering from painful conditions, are in states of severe neglect, and are possessed by a person or persons who deny the problems. The environment and state of the animals at the Conyers residence presented a classic case of animal hoarding.
- 8. Based on my experience with investigation and enforcement of the North
 Carolina anticruelty statutes, I believe the dogs at Ms. Conyers' property were the
 victims of animal cruelty under Section 14-360 and Section 19A-1(2) of the North
 Carolina General Statutes, because they had conditions that the veterinarians
 reported caused pain and suffering, and because the dogs were deprived of
 necessary sustenance. Specifically, I saw:
 - a. All the dogs were living in a fetid and ammonia-filled environment that threatened their health;
 - b. Many puppies, who are especially sensitive to toxins, were being exposed to what I understand were extremely high levels of ammonia. This environment itself was dangerous to these puppies, as well as their nursing mothers;

c. There was severe overcrowding of the dogs in the enclosures that did exist;

d. The environment was infested with various types of insects, in large numbers. This created a situation that threatened its inhabitants with disease;

e. Dogs are fastidious animals who depend on humans to care for them, and these dogs were forced to live in their own excrement, which caused them to suffer;

f. The birds lived in putrid and insect-infested cages, with large piles of feces, indicating they had not been cared for in an extended period of time; and

g. Many of the dogs had bad tooth decay and severe oral disease which I have been told by veterinarians is very painful.
